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### **Castle Garden**

Before Ellis Island, many immigrants came through Castle Garden, also known as Castle Clinton. It was located off the southwestern tip of Manhattan and was New York's first immigrant processing center. Immigrants came through Castle Garden from 1 August 1855 through 1 April 1890. However, this website covers immigration from 1820-1913 with more than 11 million immigrants listed.

### **Chronicling America (Library of Congress)**

The Library of Congress and the National Endowment for the Humanities teamed up and digitized many newspapers from 1836-1963. This is only a sampling of newspapers throughout the United States and is no way inclusive of all newspapers ever printed.

### **Cyndi's List**

Updated daily, this site is an index to many of the genealogical site available on the internet. It is a good starting place if you are looking for genealogy sites on particular subject areas. There are nearly 320,000 links through Cyndi's List. This website links to both pay-for-use and free websites.

### **Ellis Island**

There were more than 22 million immigrants who came to America through the port of New York at Ellis Island between 1892 and 1924. Searches are free but copies of the actual record are not. Information includes immigrants' given names, surnames, ethnicity, last place of residence, date of arrival and age, ship of travel, port of departure and line number on the manifest. To make the best use of this website, it is necessary to register. There is no registration fee.

This website is supported by the LDS Church of Christ and includes both domestic and international records. Many of the records are abstracts while others include actual images. Some abstracts are linked with partners, such as Ancestry and Fold3 which may charge a fee to access the records. Other images need to have a free login to view.
